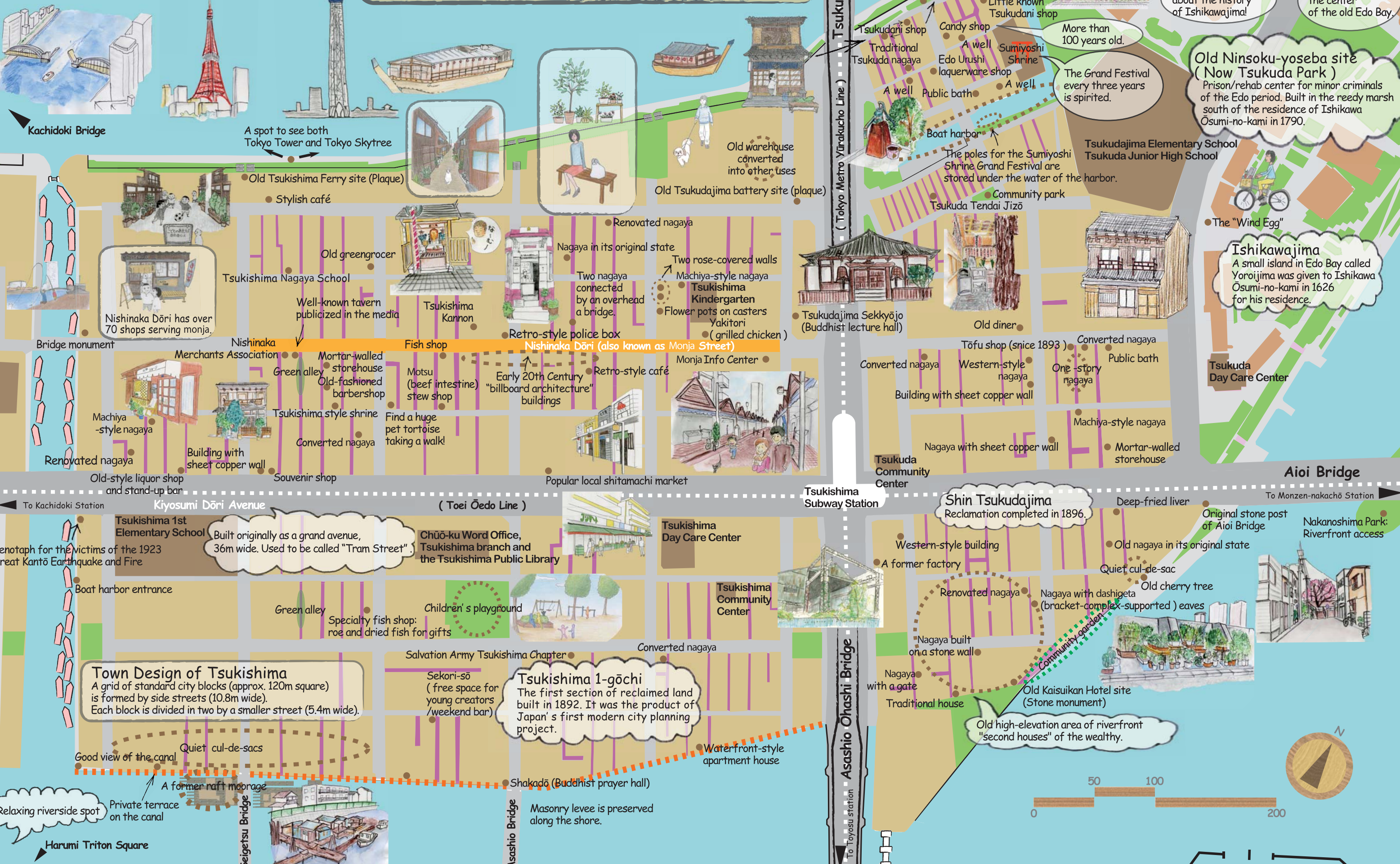


Tsukishima Alley Map

Tsukishima, popularly known for monja, is an island in Tokyo Bay filled with friendly alleys and homey nagaya row-houses. Strolling among the nagaya, time flows slowly, no cars enter to interrupt the quiet. Residents casually greet each other and chat among potted-plant gardens along the streets.



Tsukudajima
In 1644, reclamation of the tidal flats was completed after more than a decade of hard work by Tsukuda fisherfolk moved from Osaka. Legend says they labored around the clock between fishing jobs.

Reiganjima Water Level Observation (across the river)
Ishikawajima Museum
A good place to learn about the history of Ishikawajima!
Reiganjima was the center of the old Edo Bay.

Old Ninsoku-yoseba site (Now Tsukuda Park)
Prison/rehab center for minor criminals of the Edo period. Built in the reedy marsh south of the residence of Ishikawa Ōsumi-no-kami in 1790.

Ishikawajima
A small island in Edo Bay called Yoroijima was given to Ishikawa Ōsumi-no-kami in 1626 for his residence.

Town Design of Tsukishima
A grid of standard city blocks (approx. 120m square) is formed by side streets (10.8m wide). Each block is divided in two by a smaller street (5.4m wide).
